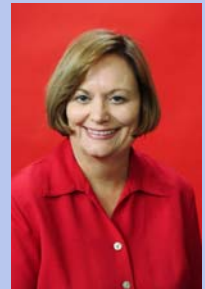

Routledge, publisher of academic books and journals, announced its top ten full text article downloads at its annual meeting with the board of the American Educational Research Association this spring.

In the top ten most popular articles was one titled, "School leadership in context: Narratives of practice and possibility." It critiques the study of school leadership for its normative, singular, and evolutionary tendencies and suggests that different types of leaders were considered effective in different settings.

College of Education PRAXIS pass rate is in highest rank

Good news for the college of education. Each year grads seeking to be licensed to teach in Kansas public schools must pass a nationally normed exam, PRAXIS. In 2006-07 a total of 122 WSU recent grads and other grads seeking additional licensure took the exam. The WSU total pass rate was 94% exceeding the statewide pass rate of 93%. While most do pass the exam, the WSU pass rate is in the first quartile or the highest rank of institutions statewide that prepare students for licensure.
